Crime Prevention Tips: Protect Yourself from Rogue Traders and Vehicle Theft

As the days get shorter, it's important to stay vigilant and protect ourselves from the rise in rogue traders and thefts from vehicles. Here are some practical crime prevention tips to help keep your property and personal belongings secure.

Guarding Against Rogue Traders

Rogue traders are often unlicensed individuals or groups offering services at your doorstep, like roofing, driveway repairs, or gardening. Their work is typically overpriced and poor in quality. Here's how to recognize and avoid them:

- Say No to Cold Callers: Most legitimate tradespeople will not knock on your door uninvited. Politely decline their offer and ask for contact details if you are interested in their services.
- Check Credentials: Always verify a tradesperson's identity. Ask for ID, check for professional accreditation, and look for online reviews or recommendations. A legitimate company will be more than willing to provide proof.
- **Don't Pay Upfront:** Never pay in full before the work is completed. Rogue traders often ask for large deposits or full payment upfront, then disappear without completing the job.
- **Get Multiple Quotes:** If you're planning work, get at least three quotes from reputable, local businesses. This helps to avoid overpriced or untrustworthy tradespeople.
- **Report Suspicious Activity:** If you suspect a rogue trader, contact your local Trading Standards or report it to the non-emergency police line. Early reporting can help protect others in your community.

Preventing Theft from Motor Vehicles

Theft from cars remains a common crime, especially when valuables are left in plain sight. Here are a few ways to safeguard your vehicle:

- **Remove Valuables:** Never leave valuables like phones, wallets, bags, or laptops in your car, even for a short time. If you must store items, lock them in the trunk before arriving at your destination.
- Lock Doors and Windows: Always lock your vehicle and double-check all windows are closed, even when parked at home.
- Park Wisely: Park in well-lit, busy areas whenever possible. Thieves are less likely to target cars in places where they are easily seen.
- Use Security Devices: Consider using steering wheel locks or visible deterrents. Car alarms and trackers are also helpful in preventing and responding to theft.
- Disable Keyless Entry When Not in Use: Keyless cars are increasingly targeted, as thieves can intercept the signal to unlock your car. Store your key in a Faraday pouch, which blocks the signal, or disable keyless entry when it's not needed.
- **Report Break-ins Immediately:** If your vehicle is broken into, report it immediately to the police and secure your car as soon as possible.
